## UNICEF UK Gold Award

We are delighted to share that Cleves Cross Primary and Nursery School has once again been awarded Gold by UNICEF UK's Rights Respecting Schools programme – the highest accolade available. This award recognises schools that place children's rights at the heart of their ethos, policies, and practice, creating a community where rights are learned, respected, and promoted every day. Gold status demonstrates a deep and sustained commitment to these principles across all aspects of school life.

Cleves Cross has been working with UNICEF UK since 2010, achieving Silver in 2011 and Gold since 2016. Our recent re-accreditation confirms that children's rights remain firmly embedded in everything we do, positively impacting our whole school community.

As part of our ongoing commitment, we hold dedicated Rights Respecting events, including a themed morning in the autumn and a full week in the spring. This term, pupils explored Articles 2, 8, and 23 of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, focusing on equality, identity, and inclusion for children with disabilities. Activities were enriched through high-quality texts and collaborative team work.

We are proud to share our Rights Respecting journey with the wider community and continue to champion children's rights in all areas of school life.

Congratulations to everyone at Cleves Cross for maintaining Gold status and ensuring children's rights remain at the heart of our school!



## SIAMS Celebrations



We are delighted to share the outcome of our recent Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS). The inspection explored how well our school is living up to its foundation as a Church school, and we were thrilled that we received a Judgement 1 (J1) outcome — the highest possible under the current SIAMS framework.

The inspector found that our school “is living up to its foundation as a Church school and is enabling pupils and adults to flourish.”

The report highlights how our Christian vision, ‘I can do all things,’ (Philippians 4:13) is deeply embedded across school life, shaping our relationships, priorities, and sense of community. It praises the inspirational leadership across the school, our strong focus on wellbeing and inclusion, and the meaningful collective worship that brings our community together. The inspector also commends the way our RE curriculum helps pupils enjoy learning about a wide range of religious and non-religious worldviews. The report is a wonderful celebration of our community and all that we strive to achieve together.

We are incredibly proud that the report recognises the deep sense of belonging, care, and purpose that runs throughout our school and that the inspector recognised the character and enthusiasm of our wonderful children, who live out our vision each day. This outcome reflects the dedication of our staff, the support of our governors and trust, and the partnership we share with our parents and carers.

## Elf Trail Project





